

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE ST. PHILIP STITCHERS

The St. Philip Stitchers were formed in October 2014 with the dedicated focus of creating quilts for the homeless children who attend SEARCH Houston's preschool at House of Tiny Treasures. Currently our mission partners include House of Tiny Treasures, Presbyterian Children's Homes and Services and Interfaith Ministries Immigrant program. For the past 8 years, at the conclusion a Sunday service blessing the quilts,150 quilts have been donated to these mission partners.

The St. Philip community supports the mission work of the St. Philip Stitchers in a variety of ways. The Arts and Crafts Studio offers a generous work space for our monthly work days. Needed fabric, thread, notions and sewing machines have been donated. The mission Committee budgeted funds for the St. Philip

Stitchers in the beginning years, but currently donations have sustained the financial needs for the group. Money is used to purchase batting, backing fabrics and other supplies.

We meet on a Saturday, once a month, 10 AM-2 PM, at St. Philip Presbyterian Church in the designated work space mentioned above. Most of the stitchers create tops for Hope to quilt from kits she has prepared. Some stitchers cut blocks for others to piece together. Some stitchers hand sew down bindings. Most of the stitchers come with sewing knowledge.

The meetings have been a source of fellowship for attendees, most of whom are members of St. Philip. Much work is done between meetings at home, which allows for stitchers who cannot stay to pick up materials, kits of cut fabric, etc. We have storage for most of our supplies, donated machines and finished quilts in our work space.

NEGRO SPIRITUAL FUND

The Black composers of Negro spiritual music are unknown to history and therefore unable to receive royalties directed to their estates for the use of their songs. To remedy this inequity, a fund was created in 2022 and approved by the St. Philip Session where we collect voluntary "royalties" for using this music during worship services throughout the year. The Peacemaking and Social Justice Committee chose Community Music Center of Houston to benefit from these funds for the last three years. On January 9 Maurice Roberts, Director and Dr. Anne Lundy, Music Director stopped by and met with Rev. Omar Rouchon, Denise Wilborn (2025 Chairwoman) and Judith Hiott, both members of the Peacemaking and Social Justice committee to receive a check in the total of \$2,073 for funds collected in 2024.



January 26 - When Achievement Culture Becomes Toxic - And What We (the Church) Can Do About it - Can the church be an antidote to the mental health crisis for adolescents affected by a high pressure achievement culture that invites them to jump into a perfect storm of meaningless, joyless, mostly-hopeless striving towards unobtainable goals that are unlikely to be fulfilling even if obtained? Can the church provide a supportive nurturing community that offers a sense of "mattering" - a sense of meaning and purpose? - Presented by Dr. Laura Lomax-Bream, Director of Center for Wellbeing and Success - Psychologist at The Kinkaid School and Rev. Keatan King - Associate Pastor at St. Philip, with focus on ministry with youth and young adults - February 2 -Innovation is Renovation: The Lord's Prayer as a Site of Transformation in the Occult Revival - In partnership with Rice University's "Humanities and Communities" Project, upper-level Ph.D. students in the School of the Humanities are taking their research "beyond the hedges" in an effort to make their work available and accessible beyond the academic community. - At the turn of the 20th century, many Christians reconsidered their faith in light of the development of scientific materialism and encounter with religious texts from India.
