

WORSHIP NOTES

To receive communion today, please come forward via the center aisle, for a piece of bread. The bread may be dipped in the chalice of grape juice and consumed or you may take a small cup of grape juice from the tray. You may return to your pew via the side aisles. Gluten-free bread is available, just ask the servers as you come forward. Those with mobility challenges may receive communion in their seats, just signal the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

Today's communion offering supports the Peace and Global Witness Offering, one of the four Presbyterian special offerings received through the year. The Offering encourages and equips congregations and individuals to become peacemakers themselves, finding and addressing the anxiety and discord prevalent throughout our broken world. Midcouncils retain 25% of offering receipts for regional ministries. Another 50% supports the Presbyterian Mission Agency's

global peace and justice initiatives. Congregations are encouraged to use up to 25% of the offering for local peacemaking efforts. St. Philip will be donating its 25% of the Offering to **Texas Impact**, which equips faith leaders and their congregations with the information, opportunities, and outreach tools to educate their communities and engage with lawmakers on pressing public policy issues. This election year, St. Philip is participating in Texas Impact's *Texas Faith Votes* campaign and its BallotReady initiative, a nonpartisan, data-driven tool that helps voters register, make a plan to vote, and look up their elected representatives. The BallotReady QR code unique to St. Philip appears to the right.



Gifts may be brought to the front basket during the final hymn. You may also make a secure contribution through MyStPhilip and choosing the communion fund or by sending a check to the church office, with "Communion" in the memo line.

Today's worship service includes traditional Negro Spiritual music. The Black composers of this music are unknown to history and therefore unable to receive royalties directed to their estates for the use of their songs. To remedy this inequity, a fund has been created and approved by the Session where we will collect voluntary "royalties" for using this music. Anyone may donate to the fund by going to the <u>saintphilip.net</u> homepage and selecting *Make a Contribution*, then selecting Negro Spirituals as the fund. Members can also access this page on the MyStPhilip app (also linked to from the homepage). You may also contribute by writing a check with *Negro Spirituals* in the memo line and placing it in the offering plate or mailing it to the church office. This small gesture of reparation seeks to help heal the long history of injury to Black persons. Contributions received over the course of the year will be donated annually to a local organization supporting Black musical traditions.

MUSIC NOTES

Today's voluntaries, both drawn from larger works for cello and continuo, are by two of the most influential composers of the early 18th century. Over the course of a long and incredibly productive lifetime, Georg Philipp Telemann produced reams of music, including a cello sonata that he included in a 1728-29 serial publication entitled *Der getreue Musik-Meister* ("The Faithful Music Master"). This journal, with dozens of short pieces by Telemann and other composers, for all sorts of instruments and voices, offered straightforward instruction and recreation in music to hundreds of subscribers. From the D-Major Sonata we've excerpted a soulful slow movement and a lilting fast movement.

In a comparatively brief but equally celebrated career, Giovanni Battista Pergolesi, composer of a short comic opera that continues to delight modern audiences (*La Serva Padrona*), also completed a handful of fine instrumental works. Though long associated with him, his authorship of a cheery Sinfonia in F major is iffy. In any case, the work was later taken up by Igor Stravinsky, who quotes it in his ballet on the story of *Pulcinella*.

Since its first adoption by the US Presbyterian Church in 1936, Protestant faiths have observed World Communion Sunday, a day in which we renew our commitment to unity and cooperation with fellow Christians around the world. Today's musical selections reflect these values.

A beautiful encapsulation of the spirit of World Communion Sunday, this arrangement of the hymn **For Everyone Born** comes from Tom Trenney, a renowned speak-

er, composer, and organist at his home church, First Plymouth Church in Lincoln, Nebraska. Trenney's music is wide-ranging in style, but consistently reverential for the message being communicated through the text. In this work, Trenney brings the text to life through text painting – like splitting voices singing the word "dividing" – and by exploring textures and colors of the choir paired with a flowing cello obligato. Together, word and music deliver an emphatic message of unity and equality.

A former seminary student and dedicated church musician, Lloyd Larson's extensive catalog of over 2000 published works spans multiple genres of church music, including works for choir, keyboard, handbells, and others. Both **Break Thou**, the **Bread of Life** and **Let Us Break Bread Together** come from a set of three pieces that celebrate the sacrament of communion through creative settings of well-known hymn tunes.

Wondrous Love is a familiar hymn that explores the foundational origin of Holy Communion and offers a contrasting tone for this World Communion Sunday. One of many spiritual songs arranged for a cappella voices by Parker and Shaw, this particular version creates drama with each passing verse, beginning with a tenor and bass duet before gradually unfolding into a contrapuntal (multiple melodic lines) texture involving the entire chorus.






