WORSHIP NOTES

Reign of Christ is the final Sunday of the church year. This day centers us on the crucified and risen Christ, whom God has exalted to rule over the whole universe. The celebration of the lordship of Christ looks back to Ascension, Easter, and Transfiguration, and points ahead to the appearing in glory of the King of kings and Lord of lords. (The Companion to the Book of Common Worship). As the season of Advent begins next Sunday, so also begins a new church year and a new year in the lectionary calendar.

The quilts that fill the sanctuary today culminate 10 months of work by the St. Philip Stitchers. We work one Saturday a month Jan-Oct, stitching small quilts for three St. Philip mission partners.

- House of Tiny Treasures is an accredited pre-school and Kindergarten for children living below the poverty line and is supported by SEARCH, Houston.
- Presbyterian children's Homes and Services provides foster care, counseling, housing for single parent families among other services.
- Interfaith Ministries provides housing for refugees new to Houston among many other services.

For these St. Philip mission partners, our quilts provide warmth to a child during nap time, a blanket of their own for a foster child and a bright welcoming addition for a refugee family new to the city.

MUSIC NOTES

This Christ the King Sunday, our service begins with a setting of the Welseyan hymn Christ, Whose Glory Fills the Sky, arranged for handbell ensemble. The poetic text, also titled "Morning Hymn" in the larger 1740 collection, places the focus entirely on Christ as the "light of the world," "the sun of Righteousness," and as the "Dayspring" and "Daystar," that leads us out of the darkness toward a more perfect day.

Taken from a larger collection of introits for various occasions, **Make Joyful Music to the Lord** employs a call-and -response style of choral writing that is ornamented by a joyful accompaniment of bell tolls. Similar to Hopson's many other liturgical works, this short call to worship reminds us to make music joyfully, with thanksgiving, singing praise to God.

Conductor and composer K. Lee Scott has an international reputation for composing sacred music that is accessible and tuneful. Based on the 13th-century Gregorian chant *Adoro te devote* ("I devoutly adore you") by Thomas Aquinas, today's **anthem** combines Scott's reverence for sacred tradition with a tuneful and expressive musical texture without distorting the understated nature of the original text and melody. We begin first with the original

chant, followed by the choral setting, which includes added handbells.

Aaron Copland's impact on the American musical landscape is vast and well-documented. His creation of a uniquely American musical sound spread quickly to contemporaries and to composers and musicians who followed him. Part of his legacy was the incorporation of American melodies, such as the Shaker melody **Simple Gifts**, which he also famously used in the climax of his work Appalachian Spring. In this more restrained version, Copland uses a sparse accompaniment with the soloists singing only text from the first verse and the chorus. The larger set was premiered in 1950 with Benjamin Britten on the piano and his personal and professional partner Peter Pears as soloist.

Bach's **Fugue in C Major BWV 545/2** begins with a simple gesture—an ascending scale in four notes—but a sophisticated plan emerges once the other voices enter. The quicker subject "tail" lends considerable liveliness to the overall texture, as entries of this two-part theme emerge on various scale steps and occasionally in surprising places.

Over the past two and a half years, the Central Mission Endowment Grant's generous support has helped turn this burgeoning program into an established partnership that now operates out of two juvenile justice locations and delivers film-based intervention programs multiple times a year. "Filmmaking is a powerful intervention strategy for youth who have had a challenging path like these teenagers, because film allows for free expression and skill-building in an otherwise regimented and structured school or correctional facility environment. The technical skill-building in filmmaking allows the teenagers to explore possible career paths in the future." - Dan Gordon - Documentary Filmmaker and Executive Director of Gordon Education Initiatives for the Performing Arts, a nonprofit with a mission to empower youth voices through the art of digital media. When it was first published, the author called this text "Christus Paradox," because so many attributes of Christ stand in tension with each other. Mindful of the works of Søren Kierkegaard, she drafted it on a commuter bus after "a particularly bad day" of prison ministry.

Each stanza of this enthronement text prepares for the final line of the refrain, based on Philippians 4:4. "Lord" is here a title of Christ rather than a reference to the undivided Trinity. The late 18th-century tune (first used with Psalm 148) captures the mood well.
