WORSHIP NOTES

On All Saints' Sunday, we remember with thanksgiving those from the St. Philip community who have died this past year: Shirley Coffman, Bill Lee, Mary Bratton, Olivia Munson, Dorothy Blackwell, Nancy Breda, Velma Guy Tolbert. The white carnations represent our remembrances of loved ones who have gone before us. The carnations may be placed on the communion table during the memorial anthem as a sign of our prayers.

To receive communion today, please come forward via the center aisle, for a piece of bread. The bread may be dipped in the chalice of grape juice and consumed or you may take a small cup of grape juice from the tray. You may return to your pew via the side aisles. Gluten-free bread is available, just ask the servers as you come forward. Those with mobility challenges may receive communion in their seats, just signal the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

Today's communion offering supports mission partner Houston Hope of the Nations. Houston Hope of the Nations was established in 2009 by Rev. Eid Abdelmassih to help immigrants and refugees from the Middle East. The mission of the center is to help the Middle Eastern community to adjust to life in Houston, helping them to grow in relationship with God, providing physical help, counseling, job search, ESL and Bible study. The Center helps people from several countries, Egypt, Iraq, Pakistan, Iran, Afghanistan, Sudan and Lebanon. Gifts may be brought to the front basket during the final hymn. You may also make a secure contribution through <u>MyStPhilip</u> and choosing the communion fund or by sending a check to the church office, with "Communion" in the memo line.

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MUSIC NOTES

Today's **opening voluntary** is a sprightly, dance-like organ setting of a traditional African hymn, whose text calls us to "Listen, God is calling through the word: inviting, offering forgiveness, comfort, and joy." The full text and tune may be found at No. 456 in our pew hymnals. The hymn melody of today's **closing voluntary** has multiple names: "All Saints" is the same tune as "Zeuch mich, zeuch mich mit den Armen," a German chorale from the mid 17th century. In its standard English translation, its text asks in its first line "Who are these, like stars ascending?"

Besides his numerous accolades and recognition in his native England and around the world, Howard Goodall has also received many performances here in Houston, including the piece from which most of today's music is drawn. **"Eternal Light: A Requiem"** was commissioned by London Musici to celebrate its 20th anniversary as both a choral-orchestral-dance piece for London Musici, The Choir of Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford, and Rambert Dance Company, and as a choral-orchestral work, receiving its world premiere in September 2008 and its North American premiere at nearby St. Luke's United Methodist in Houston a year later.

Unlike the Catholic liturgical template from which the structure and mood of many well-known Requiems are based, Goodall chooses to take what he calls a "Brahmsian" approach to his work. Rather than exploring the familiar notion of the living interceding on behalf of those who are departed in the hopes they are granted everlasting life, Goodall instead acknowledges the deep loss and emptiness suffered by the living and diverts from the more typical musical moods for various parts of the traditional requiem mass (more comfort, less fiery damnation). In further connection to Brahms and his *Ein Deutches Requiem*, Goodall also combines excerpts of traditional Latin mass text with poignant English poetry throughout the work, often placing them simultaneously or antiphonally between soloist and choir, and in all cases highlighting themes compassion for the bereaved and everlasting light.

In honor of All-Saints Sunday, the St. Philip music program is glad to present a portion of Goodall's requiem, as well as his lovely setting of **The Lord is my shepherd** (**Psalm 23**), throughout this morning's service. We also hope you will come back this evening at 5pm to hear the complete requiem and other beautiful music with string orchestra as we continue to honor the cloud of witnesses who have passed on before us.
