

### **WORSHIP NOTES**

To receive communion today, please come forward via the center aisle, receive a piece of bread. The bread may be dipped in the chalice of grape juice and consumed or you may take a small cup of grape juice from the tray. You

may return to your pew via the side aisles. Gluten-free bread is available; just ask the servers as you come forward. Those with mobility challenges may receive communion in their seats; just signal the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

An additional offering is received when communion is celebrated. This month's Communion Offering supports Benefactora Mission Clinica Bethesda, which provides 24/7 medical services and spiritual assistance to people who are in low economic situations in Xocempich & Merida, Yucatan. The Sutherland Nurses Aid school, located on the clinic grounds, provides medical training for young women in the area. The founder, Dr. Jose Estrella, received his education through the generosity of Presbyterian missionaries in the Yucatan. That generosity has been extended to many of his Mayan patients and students through the years. Dr. Estrella went home to be with our Lord in August of 2017, leaving his sons, Dr. Federico Estrella and Rev. Pablo Estrella (with us today) to continue his work. Mission Partners with St. Philip since 2001, the clinic & school are also partners with Living Waters and Project Cure. St. Philippians have an open invitation to travel to Merida to visit the clinic. Gifts may be brought to the front basket during the final hymn. You may also make a secure contribution through MyStPhilip and choosing the Communion fund or by sending a check to the church office, with "Communion" in the memo line.

At the Transfiguration of the Lord, we celebrate the revelation of divine glory in the human life of Jesus Christ. Jesus' radiant appearance on the mountaintop evokes the consuming fire of the glory of the Lord at Mount Sinai. Standing with Moses and Elijah, Jesus represents the fulfillment of the law and the prophets. The transfiguration looks back to Jesus' incarnation and baptism, as God again claims him as a beloved child. This event also looks forward to his death and resurrection, as the one who is lifted up on the cross will reveal the glorious victory of God. The Transfiguration of the Lord is observed on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday, when the season of Lent begins.

More about Opus 1—The Opus 1 Chamber Music School is a non-profit dedicated to making elite youth and adult chamber music education accessible to all. Our internationally recognized coaching faculty (Drs. Matt Lammers, Marisa Ishikawa, and Eunghee Cho) and guest artists from top universities, conservatories, and ensembles mentor students from across the Houston area who have been placed into small ensembles. In these chamber ensembles, students receive coachings, solo and chamber masterclass opportunities throughout the year, and performance opportunities. Opus 1 is devoted to serving youth and families who are unable to afford ensemble experiences or who don't have access to chamber music performances. Our no-questions-asked financial aid program opens the Opus 1 community to all, and as a Community Education Partner of Chamber Music Houston, Opus 1 faculty, guest artists, and students receive support to give free community concerts. The quartet you hear today are our Opus 1 Ambassadors, high school students who share leadership, experience, and a mission to spread chamber music across the Houston community. Thanks to training sponsored by Chamber Music Houston, they will give youth-to-youth outreach presentations throughout the spring in a variety of underserved youth community centers.

### **MUSIC NOTES**

Today's service features the Opus 1 Ambassador Quartet, a group of high school students who promote values of leadership, experience, and a mission to spread chamber music across the Houston community. Opus 1, a community chamber music school here in Houston, is dedicated to serving communities who are unable to access chamber music experiences and providing high-level music education and free performances around the city. We are glad to welcome them to worship at St. Philip this morning.

Composed towards the end of Mozart's life, **String Quartet No.19 in C Major, K.465** is one of six quartets dedicated to fellow Austrian composer, Franz Joseph Haydn. Like many of Haydn's works, K. 465 carries a nickname, "Dissonance," referring to the unusual counterpoint in the first movement's slow introduction. With no commissioning patron involved, these quartets represent a significant personal labor by Mozart, who chose to compose all four voices at once—combining Haydn's quartet writing with Bach's counterpoint—rather than his normal practice of writing main voices first and filling in the rest later. The result, at least as it appears in this movement, is a denser and more dissonant texture, hence the quartet's well-earned nickname.

Copland composed his set of Four Motets while studying with renowned French composer Nadia Boulanger in 1921. Boulanger, a master teacher who mentored some of the greatest composers and musicians of the 20th century, required her pupils to compose in traditional forms, the motet among them. Sing Ye **Praises to Our King**, the last of the set, is written in a clear three-part form but displays a variety of textures within it, including abrupt shifts from full choir to quartet and playful interplay between voice parts.

Schubert's **String Quartet No. 14 in D minor, D. 810** is considered widely to be a pillar of chamber music repertoire. Battling illness and a serious downturn in his career, Schubert wrote the quartet as an authentic expression of facing his own impending death. The quartet receives its nickname ("Death and the Maiden") from the theme and variations in the second movement based on Schubert's own art song of the same name composed in 1817.

Like his other mighty oratorio *Elijah*, Mendelssohn's *Paulus*, Op.36 outlines the life of the biblical character through adaptations of biblical passages, in this case the mission, persecution, and martyrdom of the apostle Paul. Our communion music begins with the aria **"O God, Have Mercy,"** sung in part one by the main character Saul (as a bass soloist) as he undergoes his baptism and conversion to become the Apostle Paul.

An appropriate pairing with the opening, Beethoven's **String Quartet No. 5 in A major** was modeled after Mozart's quartet in the same key (K.464). Our closing voluntary comes from the third movement—also a theme and variations—that begins with a very Mozartean tune that is spun in various ways building to a final celebratory variation.


Jesus, Take Us to the Mountain
