We confess that we don't know how to confess for we have admitted sins we haven't committed, prayed prayers so broad and vague, they've covered everything and blushed at nothing.


We have felt guilty about the wrong things, and innocent about real wrong we have done, or real good we have not done.



#### **WORSHIP NOTES**

#### **Today's Lectionary readings:**

- Joshua 5:9-12 The Israelites keep Passover at Gilgal; God rolls away their disgrace.
- Psalm 32—Happy are those whose sin is forgiven; be glad, rejoice in the Lord.
- 2 Corinthians 5:16–21 *In Christ there is a new creation; everything old has passed away.*
- Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32 The parable of the Prodigal Son; he was lost and has been found.

### **MUSIC NOTES**

Our **organ voluntaries** this morning are the outer movements from a set of three works for organ solo (BWV 669-671). Unlike a similar set (BWV 672-674), often referred to as 'small' Kyrie since they were composed only for hands, the 'great' Kyrie movements presented today are written in an older style of counterpoint that harkens back to the Renaissance. Bach's placement of the cantus firmus melody in each movement symbolizes the three facets of the Trinity: God the Father in the soprano (BWV 669), God the Son among the voices in the tenor (BWV 670), and finally God the Holy Ghost represented in the pedal bass (BWV 671).

Moses Hogan's extensive and important catalog of traditional spirituals continues to impact worship services and concert halls around the world with music that boldly conveys deeply-held emotions to its listeners. Today's **introit** delivers a mood of peace throughout using flowing melodic lines, expressive harmonies, and engaging choral textures whether sung or hummed. A simple text also effectively communicates the work's message, growing more powerful with each repetition.

In a full ensemble number, our children's music program—along with special guests—present an uplifting **anthem** of praise with text by Charles Wesley and music by Texan composer Jody Lindh. The text, tune, and musical texture call for praising God through all kinds of music, an

instruction we are doing our best to follow today by using handbells, piano, and various instruments.

Elaine Hagenberg's **All Things New** offers a muchneeded message of hope in her interpretation of a familiar passage from Revelation. The piece is organized into two general styles, one with flowing phrases supported by a shimmering accompaniment, and a sparse texture that grows in range and dynamic, which conveys a strong sense of assurance at the arrival of the refrain. Hagenberg's music is characterized by engaging melodies and piano writing, as well as an emotional authenticity that helps effectively reach its performers and listeners.

After its premiere in 1737, Handel's opera *Berenice* became a far less successful endeavor than his earlier operatic attempts, earning only three further performances. Despite the enormous success of earlier *opera seria* works like *Rinaldo*, which focused heavily on solo arias for virtuoso singers, only a few excerpts from *Berenice* achieved any kind of popularity, although the Baroque revival of the mid-20th century brought renewed interest in Handel's music. Today's **offertory** is the most familiar aria from the opera, sung by the character Demetrio in Act Two.




