

Today's Lectionary readings:

MUSIC NOTES

Both of today's **organ voluntaries** take the same Easter hymn as inspiration: the German chorale tune *Herzlich tut mich erfreuen* ("Awake, My Heart, with Gladness"). The Belgian composer and organist Flor Peeters was an important exponent of the Baroque repertoire; one senses in his chorale settings especially the long shadow of Bach and other German composers. Johannes Brahms's setting of the same tune, from his final collection of pieces (Op. 122), conveys a kind of gentle joy at the message of Easter. This is a chorale prelude in the traditional mode, with the melody on top of the texture and accompanying figuration below that surges along quietly.

Today's **introit** is excerpted from the work *Exultate, justi* by 16th-century Italian composer and friar, Lodovico Grossi da Viadana. Viadana, who helped spur the early development of the basso continuo and figured bass (using numeric symbols above a bass line to indicate harmony), was the first to implement them in published collections of Italian sacred music, which would have included many motets like this one.

One of many gems in John Rutter's catalog, our **anthem** is an inspiring setting of text by the composer that evokes imagery of small miracles in nature on this Earth Day. Rutter's melodicism is on full display in this short anthem, using a common melody for each verse, but adjusting slightly the voices or accompaniment to pair each new text. Each refrain then responds in kind to each verse, growing in wonder of the many small miracles that surround us every day.

Based on "an Old Southern Hymn Tune," today's **offertory** offers a thoughtful setting of text derived from the first six verses of Psalm 23. Although the tune is sung often as a congregational hymn (803 in our hymnals), Thomson's setting includes more gradual transitions between verses than a typical hymn, with staggered entrances in the choir, with evolving choral lines closely tied to emotional shifts in the text.




Hymn 37

Written for an easy-to-sing folk melody familiar in England as well as Wales, this 20th-century North American text bears many resemblances to both Psalm 148 and the traditional canticle *Benedicite, omnia opera Domini* (Bless the Lord, all you works of the Lord).




Although it uses remarkably simple language, this text affirms a great mystery: beyond all our powers of explanation, God holds together all the opposites that seem to pull us in one direction or another. Yet God is present to them all and also to us; for that we give praise.

Guitar chords do not correspond with keyboard harmony.

Though a lack of punctuation makes this text appear freeform and the flowing tune enhances a sense of movement, each stanza here is firmly anchored by a final weighty word (praise, save, thanks, life, peace,
