#### WORSHIP NOTES

In October 2024, Hallie Spence became the Director of Christian Education & Program Development at New Braunfels Presbyterian. All her life she has been involved with the Children and Youth ministries at various churches in Texas and North Carolina, where she found her calling to educational ministry. In her new position at NBPC she not only oversees the faith formation of all ages in the church community, but she also leads and plans the weekly Chapel service with the preschool classes. She is the daughter of Paxton and Mary Linda Williams, and grew up at St. Philip where she was involved in the children, Youth, and music ministries. With the help of the Freeman Scholarship from St. Philip, she graduated from Union Presbyterian Seminary with a Master of Arts in Christian Education. Before working at NBPC she volunteered with the children and family ministries at Round Rock Presbyterian, First UMC Georgetown, and Good News UMC Cedar Park. She has a passion for and is privileged to preach as pulpit supply when called upon. She and her husband David celebrated their 20th wedding anniversary in May!

### Today's Lectionary readings:

- 1 Samuel 3:1-10 (11-20) The Lord calls to the boy Samuel; Samuel responds, "Here I am."
- Psalm 139:1-6, 13-18 Lord, you have searched me and known me; you are always with me.
- Deuteronomy 5:12–15 *Observe the sabbath day and keep it holy, says the Lord.*
- Psalm 81:1–10 *Sing aloud to God, who brought you up from the land of Egypt.*
- 2 Corinthians 4:5-12—We have this treasure in clay jars; the life of Jesus is revealed in you.
- Mark 2:23 3:6 The sabbath was made for humankind; Jesus is Lord of the sabbath.

### **MUSIC NOTES**

The keyboard music of Johann Jakob Froberger, one of the most influential composers of the 17th century, illustrate how this well-traveled and versatile musician adapted the German contrapuntal style to the new Italian genres of his day. His **Toccata I** from the *Livre de 1656* (his second published collection) combines free fantasy with imitative counterpoint in a work whose overall structure points toward the later "prelude and fugue" format of Bach and others.

Some of the most prolific and highly regarded English composers claim their roots firmly in the Anglican liturgical traditions, examples of which are heard in today's **introit** and **anthem** composed centuries apart. One of many short *a cappella* works by Renaissance composer Christopher Tye, this English translation of *Laudate nomen Domini* contains a mixture of homophony (harmony in uniform rhythm) and staggered entrances of individual voices, both common features of the 16th-century style. Similar elements of homophony can be heard in our anthem, a tender setting of a passage from Psalm 119 composed more than four centuries later. Stopford marks the change of stanza with clear, but understated changes in tonality and voicing.

Today's **offertory** is one of many arrangements of an American Christian Spiritual "Give Me Jesus," the original version of which was published in the 1845 collection of hymns *The Evangelical Harp*. Mark Hayes' more contemporary version features a delicate but expressive melody, combined with subtle harmonic and rhythmic shifts in the accompaniment that enhance but never distract from the text.

Johann Sebastian Bach, who was in turn a great admirer of Froberger's art, embraced virtually all kinds of keyboard composition, including the variation set. His most famous such work, published in 1741 as an "Aria with Diverse Variations," has long been connected (perhaps wrongly) with a Russian diplomat named Keyserling and a young harpsichordist in his service by the name of Goldberg. Whether or not Bach wrote these famous variations for the teenage Goldberg, they comprise some of his most imaginative and charming pieces in the genre.

# MISSION ACTIVITIES

SAVE THE DATE: CCSC NON-PERISHABLE FOOD DRIVE DURING THE MONTH OF JUNE—During the month of June, the Mission Committee will be collecting non-perishable food donations for drop off at the Gathering Area mission table or at the church office. Examples of the different kinds of foods you can drop off include dry beans (1- or 2-pound bags), hearty soups, dry rice (1- or 2-pound bags), canned tuna or chicken, peanut butter, boxed dry cereal, pasta sauce, baby food or formula, toilet paper, canned fruit (all types), canned vegetables (all types), and dry pasta/mac and cheese. Food donations will be collected from June 2 to 30. The food is especially needed in the summer months because children are out of school and their families must provide their breakfast and lunch, which are usually provided by the school.

SAVE THE DATE: KIDS MEALS' ST. PHILIP VOLUN-TEER DAY MONDAY, JULY 8-St. Philip mission partner Kids' Meals will host a group from St. Philip on Monday, July 8, from 12:30 - 2:30 p.m., to help prepare sack lunches for children at home during summer vacation. The mission of Kids' Meals is to end childhood hunger by delivering free, healthy meals, year-round to the doorsteps of the greater Houston area's hungriest preschool-aged children and through collaboration provide their families with resources to help end the cycle of poverty. Over the past 17 years, Kids' Meals has provided more than 14 million free, healthy meals to Houston's hungriest children. In 2024, Kids' Meals will make and deliver at least 2.77 million healthy meals, provide healthy produce and groceries at least three times per week, and leverage their daily access to connect children and families with wrap-around services from more than 70 partner service organizations. Kids' Meals cannot reach these goals without volunteers. St. Philip grants support the Healthy Meal Delivery Program. Please save the date to volunteer at Kids' Meals on July 8. 


