WORSHIP NOTES

Today's readings and prayers are borrowed from various sources such as:

- 2 Samuel 6:1-5, 12b-19 Returning the ark to Jerusalem, David dances before the Lord.
- Psalm 24 Lift up your heads, O gates, that the King of glory may enter!
- Amos 7:7–15 *God shows the prophet Amos a plumbline, a vision of justice.*
- Psalm 85:8-13 Love and faithfulness will meet; righteousness and peace will kiss.
- Ephesians 1:3-14 We were chosen in Christ from the beginning to give glory to God.
- Mark 6:14-29 Herod puts John the Baptist to death; reports of Jesus spread.

MUSIC NOTES

J.S. Bach and Antonio Vivaldi were giants of the Baroque and masters of their craft, who penned some of the most important works for the cello in all of Western art music. Bach's suites for solo cello and Vivaldi's cello sonatas, both firm staples in the modern cellist's repertoire, share a common structure of short, multimovement pieces that are highly rhythmic and tuneful. Both opening and closing **voluntaries** feature the instrument's dexterity, warm tone and register, and boundless expressive capability.

By measures of both quality and quantity, Charles Wesley is one of, if not the greatest hymn-writer of all time. Today's **introit** is an arrangement of one of his more beloved tunes and text, here performed by our wonderful handbell ensemble. The text of our choral **anthem**, a lovely modern setting inspired by Philippians 4, encourages us to think on all the things that are

noble and good. The simplicity of these words is matched by a simple choral texture that combines tender melodicism sensitive to the text with subtle rhythmic vitality, a hallmark of Mark Patterson's compositional style.

A timeless classic in the concert and church realms, our **offertory** is the fourth of five "Mystical Songs" by English composer Ralph Vaughan Williams. Each movement sets poetry by fellow Englishman, 17th-century poet George Herbert, whose simple but direct verse has an intrinsic spirituality that is reflected in the musical treatment. "The Call," consisting almost entirely of one -syllable words, epitomizes simple but direct, with allusions to both old and new testaments. 'Come' is both the poet's call to God, as well as the poet's response to God's call.


