MUSIC NOTES

Today's Opening Voluntary "Fanfare" is a majestic piece with a boisterous melody played on the tuba stop. Composer C. S. Lang (1891-1971) was a New Zealand-born British organist and music teacher. He was known for his personal magnetism and determination to awaken "the budding musicianship of every sort of pupil".

The Closing Voluntary "Rigaudon" is a variation by Georg Boehm (1661-1733), a leading organist and composer in Germany around the 1700s. His main contribution to music was the development of the "chorale partite", where a chorale melody became the basis of a set of variations. Today's voluntary demonstrates this form of music in a dance-like variation from "Suite in D dur".

Today's choral selections honor but a sample of the vast array of American musical traditions. Our **introit**, an intersection of several American figures, is an excerpt of a setting of the final stanza inscribed on the bronze plaque found on the pedestal of the Statue of Liberty. Emma Lazarus, active in aid to Jewish refugees fleeing antisemitism in Europe, agreed to include her words on the statue, viewing them as an expression of empathy towards these and other immigrants. The song's original version was composed by famed American songwriter Irving Berlin, a Jewish immigrant himself, and was included in the1949 musical "Miss Liberty."

The American Negro Spiritual is ingrained in every aspect of this country's history, extending far beyond a single musical genre, and they must be remembered and celebrated as part of any patriotic occastion. Songs like "Wade in the Water," "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," and "Steal Away" were first songs of enslaved people with hidden meanings, not only as prayers of faith, but containing codes and messages for other slaves. In this case, "steal away" would have indicated that slaves escape their slave-owners via the underground railroad.

Our **offertory** is a setting by American composer Allen Pote of Psalm 51, which carries a much-needed message of calm and humility during a turbulent and uncertain time for our country. The musical treatment of the text, through sudden but smooth modulations (changing from one tonal center to another) embodies the cleansing from sin through God's unfailing love that the psalm embodies.


